Molly Wood: Decentralized autonomous organization.

Kai Ryssdal: Decentralized autonomous organization, that group that was going to raise a bunch of money in crypto so that it can buy a copy of the US Constitution that's going on sale at Sotheby's I think tonight. And, and this is what they're saying they're gonna do. Return it to the people. So, and I kind of poo pooed them, I kind of poo pooed them. I said, come on, this thing's gonna go for like \$15 or \$20 million. And they've got \$4 million, this is like three days ago. Well, boom, more than \$40 million is what they have collected. And it's an auction. And so I don't think Sotheby's cares whether it's, you know, the man in the moon or constitution DAO, if you got 40 mil and that's the high bid, you win. And so that's that.

Molly Wood: By the way, the livestream of the auction is happening right now. It started at 6pm Eastern. I'm just going to open the YouTube and see if we can just see what's happening. By the way, they call it, just, it's brand new so there's no reason you would know this, but I just heard a podcast episode about it. Dow, constitution dow. They pronounce the DAO as dow. Mm hmm. Yeah. So there you go, I know. Things I recently learned. Exactly, like now we're gonna be like, the dow of crypto. And, and or Jones. You know, I see where you're going there with the--yeah. Apparently they're auctioning off a big scary gold statue with an alien mouth cause rich people are weird.

Kai Ryssdal: We're safe for now. Okay. Alright. Fair enough.

Molly Wood: So we're good. We'll keep an eye on it.

Kai Ryssdal: Alright. Item two for me is a thing that, that got a lot of whoha when it happened, but in practice is turning out to be not all that, and I speak here of President Biden's announcement a couple of weeks ago that he is going to convince and has convinced the ports of Los Angeles and Long Beach to go 24 hours. That matters because as we've talked about on this program before, 40% of all the containerized cargo coming in the United States comes through Los Angeles and Long Beach, and 24 hours, seven days a week would make it, you know, get more through and clear up the traffic jam. Except not. And here's why. So the port is like the landlord, and then a bunch of private companies run the terminals, run the warehouses in the wars and all this stuff, okay. And none of them have yet opened up 24/7 except the one of them. And one of them, guoting the Wall Street Journal here, one terminal in the Port of Long Beach flung open its gates for, around the clock for truckers in mid September. Here's the catch. Nobody showed up. Nobody showed up. Right. So in late September, the company said it would open during overnight hours if 25 trucks made appointments. Since then, those criteria have been met only one time, and of the 25 trucks made appointments, only five of them showed up. Now there's a lot going on here, right? Truckers are largely independent contractors, they don't get paid well, they don't get paid for the waiting time, all of that stuff. But it's another--if you heard my interview on queueing theory the other day, it's another node of variability that is not helping out at all in an already overstressed system. So all those reports you hear, including on Marketplace about this is gonna take a long time, it's gonna take a long time.

Molly Wood: Yep. Man, it really, really is. What if you went 24 hours and no one showed up for work? Yeah. Fascinating. Absolutely fascinating. Yep. Bonkers. I have a story. My primary story today is a little bit dark place for sure. Which is that the Guardian reporting that just four days after landmark climate talks in Scotland, in which Joe Biden vowed the US will lead by example in tackling dangerous global heating, the President's own administration is providing a jarring contradiction: the largest ever sale of oil and gas drilling leases in the Gulf of Mexico. Speaking of auctions, even as we are watching the auction live from Sotheby's New York--

Kai Ryssdal: That was so well done.

Molly Wood: On Wednesday, yesterday, apparently the US Federal Government auctioned off or launched an auction, sorry, of more than 80 million acres of the Gulf, which is specifically for fossil fuel extraction. And let me say again, the largest ever, largest ever, which will lock in potentially decades, they say, of planet heating emissions. I mean, it couldn't be, like the word, the phrase about face was almost invented for this move right here.

Kai Ryssdal: Yeah. It is my understanding that there's some court order, which is obliging the Biden ministration to do this, but one would imagine that they would have slow rolled it a bit more than they have, you know?

Molly Wood: You would think that, yeah, cause it's a pretty bad look. Well, and also, this story points out that the Biden administration actually has been issuing drilling permits at a clip even faster than the Trump administration did, something like 300 drilling permits. Yeah. I mean, this is, look, I have been saying publicly and privately that the United States is not going to be a leader on climate issues. We are a petrochemical state. The end. But in this case, it is, you sort of wish that it was like, at least the Trump administration was like, we pulled out of the Paris Climate Accords. We don't believe in climate change. We're like, you know drill, baby drill, right? Or they're like, I'm not, I almost, I almost prefer the upfront to the hypocrisy, because that's not good. It's not good. Also not good, I want to point out that I have, that the, there's this really disturbing story that seems to be happening, which is that the, the, you know, world ranked tennis player, Peng Shuai, accused one of the, one of China's top party leaders of sexual assault in a social media post that almost immediately disappeared. And then she herself, Ms. Peng, almost immediately disappeared, has not been heard from. And I just, I, you know, the story has been sort of percolating for a few days, and we should not ignore it. It is awful. It's terrifying. It's profoundly upsetting. And I have to say that the Women's Tennis Association has stood up to China more than almost anybody I have seen in recent memory, more than John Cena, more than, you know, the NBA, more than Hollywood. Like they're like, this is unacceptable. Where is she? And P.S., they're saying boycott the Olympics.

Kai Ryssdal: Yep. Yeah. Biden did say today, you know, a diplomatic boycott of the Beijing Olympics that are coming up is on the table. As yet undefined is what diplomatic boycott means. But yeah.

Molly Wood: Oh, and this is the kind of thing that feeds into that. Not to mention, you know, reports of literal genocide happened. I mean, the, China seems to be pulling off a holocaust, but it has the economic power to get away from it. And that's, that's why it is so remarkable in some ways that the WTA has, has been so firm and loud and determined in trying to figure out what happened to this player. It's a really, it's a really upsetting story. And then, in an abrupt shift, I just have a question for you. Yeah. Like, I can't, I gotta take my chances while I can to be like, Kai, why is this happening? Why is there a map in the Wall Street Journal of where inflation is highest in the United States and it is all the Midwest and the South. Is that just because prices were like, already high on the coasts?

Kai Ryssdal: Yeah, we have an economy, right. But actually, we've got a bajillion economies and gas costs different things in different places, housing costs different things in different places, foods expenses are different. There is an aggregate number, but that aggregate number is made up of a bajillion individual things, and that's what's going on. So inflation varies by state, by county, yeah, for sure. Yep.

Molly Wood: But this is so stark. I mean, it's just like straight up the middle. I feel like I don't understand. Yeah. It does seem like transportation, maybe. I mean, I think it's maybe places that were cheaper to start with. And the coasts were more expensive to start with. And so maybe it's not so shocking. I don't know. It's a startling map.

Kai Ryssdal: It's a percent game. I don't know. It's a percent game. Yeah. So I don't, I don't know that a load base accounts for that.

Molly Wood: Yeah, that's true. Maybe true. Anyway, check it out.

Kai Ryssdal: Yeah, Marissa will put it on the show page.

Molly Wood: Okay, there we go.
